La Feria Latino Reource Fair provides resources to the Latino community

On August 9, 2008, La Oportunidad and Metropolitan Health Plan came together to host the 14th Annual Latino Family Resource Fair (La Feria). La Feria was held in collaboration with the Midtown Farmer's Market. Two thousand fairgoers enjoyed shopping for produce from local Minnesota farmers while gathering helpful resources and connecting to service providers.

This year, a special emphasis was placed on access to community resources. A total of 90 organizations gathered at the site of the Midtown Farmer's Market to provide Latino families with a wide variety of resources including health screenings, information about social services, nutrition, and educational opportunities available in the Twin Cities Metro Area.

The day was filled with fun for the entire family. In between gathering resources for their families, fairgoers enjoyed food from La Loma restaurant and live entertainment from several local artists including Sentir Venezolano, Fuego Flamenco, Grupo Caribe and Korzel Musical. Children enjoyed playing a variety of carnival games, having their faces painted, balloon animals, an entertaining clown, and a make and take craft project.

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El Camino Students Learn Folkloric Mexican Dance

Students in the El Camino after school program at Hans Christian Andersen Open School performed la Danza de los Viejitos, a traditional Mexican dance, this fall. La Danza de los Viejitos originated in the Mexican state of Michoacan, but made its way to Minneapolis when it was taught to our El Camino group participants.

The group, comprised of second and third graders, made their own costumes before learning and performing the dance. The children made and decorated *gabanes* (shawls), skeleton masks and hats using construction paper, yarn, crayons and crepe paper.

After completing their costumes, the children were ready to learn la Danza de los Viejitos. Using wooden poles as canes, the children danced hunching over, imitating the dancing of the "viejitos."

Girl Scouts Partner with La Oportunidad

The **Padres Parenting Program** provides comprehensive programming, including collaborations, special events, and year-round classes to empower Latino parents with the tools necessary to support their children's education, raise healthy, well-adjusted children who will contribute to their communities, and promote peaceful families and communities. Because child supervision is key to the success of the program, it is provided for participating parents.

As the number of Padres Parenting Programs participants increased, so did the number of children requiring adult supervision. In order to provide a more meaningful experience for the children being supervised, La Oportunidad established a partnership with the Girl Scouts in January 2008. Currently, Latinas Unidas Girl Scouts Troop 13397 has a core group of 8 girls, ages 6-15 years old, whose parents participate in the Padres Parenting Programs at the La Oportunidad location. In addition to weekly activities, the girls and their families have participated in two camping trips.







Women Unlearn Abuse

For over 3 years, La Oportunidad, Inc. has been providing groups for women who have been abusive in their relationships or families. In 2005, there were 13 women enrolled in the Latinos Ending Abuse Program (LEAP) for Women and we have served over 50 participants to date.

LEAP for Women is an outcome-based program that provides an 8 week culturally-appropriate Spanish language program for women who have acted violently and may be mandated to participate by the court and the criminal justice system.

The program operates weekly. Women must attend an intake orientation, and then actively participate in the 8 week, 2 hour educational course. The goal is to end violence and abusive behaviors. It does not address other goals such as saving or ending relationships. It is structured so each participant learns about herself—with no blaming or attempting to "fix" a partner or others. 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Latino Youth Celebrate Ancestry




Participants in the Latino Youth Program remembered and honored their dead ancestors this fall through the celebration of Día de los Muertos (Day of the Dead). Learning about this 3,000 year old tradition has been a component of the Latino Youth Program school-based programming for many years.

This year, youth learned about the history of sugar skulls and the historical significance it has in the Día de los Muertos tradition. After learning about sugar skulls and sharing their stories about family and friends that have past away, students were able to decorate their own sugar skull to be displayed on an ofrenda in their school.

Students at Armstrong High School set up an ofrenda and answered the questions of teachers and students as they walked by. They were able to inform their classmates and teachers about the significance of Día De Los Muertos and the role that it plays in their culture and families. The ofrenda was displayed for three weeks in memory of those that have struggled for our Latino/Chicano civil rights.

At Plymouth Middle School, youth were able to show their connection to the tradition by bringing personal items from home to place on the altar they set-up at the front of the school. Many brought personal pictures of their loved ones. Some brought roses and another youth a poem written by a relative that had passed. The altar made its journey to the media center after a couple of days where students were able to learn about this important tradition.

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Mentoring Spotlight: Jennifer and Yessica

Jennifer Reidy and Yessica Zuñiga Tepango have been participants for two and a half years through La Oportunidad's Líderes del Mañana (Tomorrow's Leaders) Mentoring Program. Jennifer and Yessica spend time at least 4-8 hours together every month doing various activities and working on goals. They say they like using their time together as an opportunity to try things that they haven't done before. Some of their favorite things to do together include cooking and eating food from different cultures. As Yessica will be starting high school next year, one thing they are focusing on even more this year is planning for the future. They have set a goal during the upcoming months to talk about and visit different high schools in preparation for Yessica's move to ninth grade. They also plan on visiting several colleges and exploring different career options.

Yessica says that having a mentor has helped her in many ways. "It has helped me by giving me the confidence to talk to grown-ups. Before I didn't really like talking to my parents



because I thought that they wouldn't understand, but now I understand that they do understand and that I can talk to them whenever I need to." Yessica says that what she appreciates most about Jennifer is that "she helps me with things, she is always understanding and she gives me confidence."

Jennifer says that it has been wonderful to be with Yessica through the transition from girl to young woman. She says Yessica has taught her many things and that the greatest benefit that being a mentor has brought to her is that "it brought Yessica into my life. She helps me keep perspective, focus on what's important and have fun." Jennifer would tell anyone considering being a mentor, "It will be one of the best experiences of your life. You'll learn more than you'll be able to teach and you will both have a lot of fun along the way. Bring drive, dedication, and a smile to every outing."







Latino Youth Development Collaborative: A True and Unique Collaborative

The mission of the Latino Youth Development Collaborative (LYDC) is to increase and enhance healthy youth development and educational success for Latino youth through access, participation, leadership, and family engagement. The Collaborative has begun implementation of its activities, which fall under the following four major goals:

- 1) To increase Latino access to school and community-based academic enrichment programs,
- 2) To increase Latino participation in healthy youth development activities.
- 3) To promote Latino family engagement in educational systems, and
- 4) To develop intergenerational Latino community leadership and advocacy.

The Collaborative has now grown to include close to thirty community partners who are establishing a unified voice for the educational agenda of Latinos in Hennepin County. The Collaborative and its community partners meet on a regular basis to discuss issues affecting the educational success of our Latino youth and to provide support to one another.

Founding agencies La Oportunidad and La Escuelita secured funding for the Collaborative from Hennepin County and later received a grant from the Minneapolis Foundation.

The LYDC was created three years ago with the leadership of Hennepin County, La Oportunidad, La Escuelita, Centro, and advising from the Minnesota Department of Health's Office of Minority and Multicultural Health.

Violence can be unlearned; non-violence can be learned. The program holds participants accountable for their violence and facilitates learning alternatives to dealing with anger. Group participants learn to identify their emotions and use appropriate ways to express them, identifying cues that precede their violence and develop a self-control plan.

The program has a positive effect on families and community; women attending the program are often working to be reunited with their children. Mothers who have learned non-violent skills to resolve the conflicts they are facing are better mothers and entire families can benefit from the acquired new skills. As the program models respect for all, this learned skill is appropriate in the workplace, in schools, and in the home. When there is positive change within a healthy family, there is less dysfunction, less stress, more energy and often individuals can give back to their communities.

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
